From the south: Virgin Rail operates hourly direct services to Manchester. Journey times from London Euston to Manchester Piccadilly are approximately 2 hours.



By Road

Awards and Scholarships

NHIVNA Best Oral Presentation Award

Awarded for the best oral presentation displayed at the NHIVNA Annual Conference. A NHIVNA-invited expert panel will judge the award and will be reviewing oral presentations based on the following criteria: quality of presentation; quality of research; impact on nursing practice; originality; considered ethical issues (if appropriate).

NHIVNA Best Poster Presentation Award

Awarded for the best poster presentation displayed at the NHIVNA Annual Conference. A NHIVNA-invited expert panel will identify the top poster presentation based on the following criteria: quality of presentation; quality of research; impact on nursing practice; originality; considered ethical issues (if appropriate).

Krattinger Rennison Charitable Trust Nursing Research Award

Awarded for an original piece of research presented at the NHIVNA Annual Conference either as an oral or poster presentation. A NHIVNAinvited expert panel will judge the award and will be reviewing presentations based on the following criteria: the principal investigator is a nurse; an original piece of research; demonstrates an understanding of the research process; has an impact on nursing-related HIV policy as well as patient care; research contains an explicit discussion of the relevance of the research to nursing practice/policy; considered ethical issues (if appropriate). Winning presenters will be required to write up their research in the journal *HIV Nursing*.

NHIVNA/Mediscript Clinical Practice Award

Awarded for a clinical practice initiative that has made an impact on patient care presented at the NHIVNA Annual Conference either as an oral or poster presentation. A NHIVNA-invited expert panel will judge the award and will be reviewing presentations based on the following criteria: effective presentation; must have an impact on patient care; relate to nursing care; contain recommendation for future practice; considered ethical issues (if appropriate).

NHIVNA/Gilead Sciences HIV Nursing Award 2016

The NHIVNA/Gilead Sciences HIV Nursing Award was set up in 2007 to recognise the outstanding achievements of nurses who have made a significant or unique contribution to the care and quality of life of people with HIV. The award will consist of a fully sponsored opportunity to attend a national or international medical conference in 2016/2017.

The Jane Bruton Rising Star Award

Awarded for the best oral or poster presentation displayed at the NHIVNA Annual Conference by a student or junior nurse. A NHIVNA-invited expert panel will judge the award and will be reviewing oral and poster presentations based on the following criteria: the lead presenter must be a student or junior nurse (up to band 5–6) holding active NHIVNA membership. Nurses studying for a masters or PhD are not eligible for this award.

Junior Nurse Scholarships

NHIVNA has made available up to ten Junior Nurse Registration Concession Scholarships to assist junior nurses to attend the NHIVNA Annual Conference 2016. To be eligible for a scholarship, applicants must be NHIVNA members for the 2016 membership year and have worked as a nurse in an acute or community setting, caring for people with HIV, for 2 years or less. These scholarships have enabled successful applicants to register for the conference at the reduced registration rate of \pounds 125. Applications were administered on a first-come, first-served basis.

First-time Attendee Scholarships

NHIVNA has made available up to ten First-time Attendee Registration Concession Scholarships to assist delegates who are attending the NHIVNA conference for the first time. To be eligible for a scholarship, applicants must be NHIVNA members for 2016. These scholarships have enabled successful applicants to register for the conference at the reduced registration rate of £125. Applications were administered on a first-come, first-served basis.

NHIVNA Community Registration Support

NHIVNA has made available up to ten community registration places to delegates who work in community, voluntary or charitable organisations. Places have been allocated as fairly as possible, in principle on a first-come, first-served basis, with up to a maximum of two registrations per community group. The award covers registration for the conference only.

Pre-conference Study Day Scholarships


NHIVNA is holding a Pre-conference Study Day sponsored by AbbVie. NHIVNA Pre-conference Study Day Scholarships have been made available for those who attend, in full, both the NHIVNA Annual Conference on 30 June–1 July, and the NHIVNA Pre-conference Study Day on the afternoon of Wednesday 29 June. NHIVNA has awarded up to 20 scholarships that contribute a maximum of £50 towards travel expenses, and contribute a maximum of £100 towards accommodation costs (29 and 30 June only). Applications were administered on a first-come, first-served basis. Original receipts are required post-conference, and within two weeks of the event, in order for NHIVNA to reimburse monies.

Katherine Ajdukiewicz was appointed Consultant in Infectious Diseases and Tropical Medicine at North Manchester General Hospital in 2009; Clinical Lead for the department in 2014; and Honorary Senior Lecturer, University of Manchester in 2012. Her MD (2013) was based on research in Malawi. Katherine's specialist interests are: HIV in pregnancy and adolescence; teaching undergraduates; and on postgraduate programmes nationally.

Steve Barlow is a BACP-accredited counsellor and qualified clinical supervisor, with over 12 years' experience of working with clients both in an organisational setting and private practice. During this time, he has worked extensively in the fields of addiction, abuse, trauma, sexual health, sexuality/gender and LGBT issues, providing in-house services and training for many organisations including KCA, Turning Point, Survivors UK, Anglia Ruskin University and Terrence Higgins Trust. Recently, he was invited to design and deliver the Men's Sex Addiction groupwork programme for The Surrey Centre in London. Steve is thrilled to be invited back to present at the NHIVNA conference in 2016.

Adam Bourne is a Lecturer in Public Health at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. He specialises in community-based research that examines sexual health of marginalised communities, both in the UK and abroad. Adam has a particular interest in drug use among men who have sex with men, and has published a number of papers on this topic, which describe the context, motivations, prevalence and harms associated with drug use.

Peter Boyle is Lead Services Adviser at George House Trust, the HIV support charity in the North West of England. Peter Supports the Services & Development Manager in managing the Services Team, which provides services to people living with and affected by HIV from across the North West of England. Peter also oversees the volunteer counselling, and the being+ project which provides peer mentoring, information, courses, events and life coaching to gay and bisexual men (more targeted towards younger gay men, and gay men in employment).

Darren Brown is a Clinical Specialist HIV Physiotherapist at Chelsea and Westminster NHS Foundation Trust. He provides both inpatient and outpatient rehabilitation interventions for adults living with HIV and HIV-associated malignancies. He leads the outpatient HIV specialist physiotherapy service and developed the 'Kobler Rehabilitation Class', a group rehabilitation intervention for adults living with HIV, including supervised group exercise and an educational self-management programme. Darren is the Vice-chair of Rehabilitation in HIV Association (RHIVA), HIV/AIDS coordinator of the World Confederation of Physical Therapy network IPT-HOPE, and a member of Canada-UK HIV Rehabilitation Research Collaborative (CUHRRC).

Del Campbell has previously worked as a Project Manager at the charity Streetwise Youth, set up to support male escorts. For ten years he was the Community Engagement Manager at Terrence Higgins Trust where he managed the SWISH (Sex Workers into Sexual Health) project. This role supported male, female and transgender sex workers over seven London boroughs, empowering them to look after their health, well-being and safety. Del has recently taken on a new role as the Police & Criminal Justice Advocate for the charity National Ugly Mugs (NUM), ensuring police forces and projects across London are aware of recently agreed protocols when dealing with sex workers.

Patrick Cash works as a Patient Champion for Chelsea and Westminster Trust, based at 56 Dean Street in Soho. He specialises in community engagement within HIV/GUM and MSM patient cohorts, who may engage in ChemSex. Within this remit he runs the monthly community forum Let's Talk About Gay Sex & Drugs at London's Ku Bar, which has now spread to Brighton and Berlin. Patrick will speak on how community engagement and the arts can be used to enhance empathy and improve collective mental health, leading to better physical health choices.

Jayne Churchill is a qualified RGN and RMN with over 20 years' experience in blood-borne virus (BBV) work, including inpatient, palliative and community mental health. She is currently employed as a BBV Mental Health Nurse & Nurse Counsellor. Jayne works as part of a multidisciplinary mental health team within the Regional Infectious Diseases Unit, Edinburgh. Jayne was an elected NHIVNA Executive from 2010–2013. She has an interest in motivational interviewing (MI) and uses it in her practice. She is part of a team that has developed and delivers MI training and coaching within Sexual Health & HIV in NHS Lothian.



Annette Colcutt is a Registered Nurse and Senior Sexual Health Adviser at 56 Dean Street, a busy sexual health clinic in Soho, seeing large numbers of MSM around risk reduction and ChemSex. Annette has 21 years' experience in the NHS in HIV/sexual health, and has a particular interest in working with LGBT clients, and the changing needs of the gay community.

Michelle Croston has worked at North Manchester's Infectious Diseases Research Department since beginning her nursing career. During her time on the ward, she gained a lot of experience – from palliative care to treating HIV patients in a high-dependency setting. She experienced the challenges of complex patient care and witnessed the stigma associated with the condition. After undertaking health visitor training, Michelle subsequently moved to North Manchester's HIV Support Team. As part of her professional development, she is undertaking a professional doctorate, and her research focuses on how HIV nurses elicit patients' concerns in order for them to provide patient centred care. Alongside the duties that she will be assigned within the Executive Committee, Michelle hopes to work on developing evidence-based strategies aimed at improving standards of care for patients, with a specific interest in developing strategies and resources to help nurses provide psychological support for PLWHIV.

Valerie Delpech is a Public Health Physician and Epidemiologist leading on the national surveillance of HIV infections at Public Health England. She trained in medicine and public health in Australia and the UK, and has extensive experience in communicable disease control and public health. Valerie's research interests have focused on better understanding the epidemiology of HIV and STIs and public health interventions to prevent these infections among vulnerable populations. Valerie serves on a number of national and international committees in relation to HIV surveillance, prevention and policy development, and is an executive trustee for the National AIDS Trust.

Bob Downes trained as a nurse in Liverpool in the mid-1970s and has worked in a variety of NHS settings over the past 40 years. Anyone who knows Bob is aware of his passion for the NHS, nursing as a profession and caring for patients. He has worked as an HIV Community Nurse since 1995 and is immensely proud of the Community HIV Service developed in response to the needs of patients and the challenges of the HIV pandemic. Working as a Community HIV Nurse has enabled Bob to work autonomously, be innovative, creative and to develop programmes of care and projects appropriate to address the unmet need of those living with HIV.

Andy Hilton is a Director of Result CIC, a social enterprise who specialise in providing development opportunities through training and coaching for people living with disability or long-term illness. Having lived with HIV for 30+ years, Andy has combined his personal and professional experiences to run a number of coaching programmes with HIV support organisations around the UK. Andy is Chair of the National Long-Term Survivors Group (NLTSG), who run residential weekends for PLWHIV for five years or more.

Ian Hodgson is a consultant researcher, educator, and advocate, involved for 19 years in the HIV sector. His areas of interest include: global health; HIV stigma; cultural determinants of HIV prevention; HIV treatment access; adolescents living with HIV; advocacy; and project evaluation. He has worked in a range of locations in Asia, Africa and Europe, and is a member of the Executive Committee of the European HIV Nursing Network that, in association with the International Association of Providers in AIDS Care (IAPAC) and NHIVNA, hosts a conference for Europe-wide nurses working in HIV. Ian is PhD supervisor for students undertaking health-based research, and delivers sessions on global health advocacy at Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland.

Alastair Hudson has worked as a freelance consultant with many of the UK's leading sexual health organisations, including The International Planned Parenthood Federation, AHPN, NAZ, FPA and The British HIV Association. His company, Ayedear Productions Ltd, has worked across a range of projects and agendas including The David Kato Vision and Voice Award, The Criminialize Hate not HIV Campaign, Positive Awareness of and Attitudes to HIV, and The People Living with HIV Stigma Survey UK. Alastair has been living with HIV since 2009, and is a passionate activist and story teller.



Bronagh McBrien is the Lead Pharmacist for HIV and Sexual Health at The Hathersage Centre, Central Manchester University Trust. As an independent prescriber, her role as a pharmacist based in an outpatient clinic is varied and challenging. Bronagh works closely with a dynamic team of HIV nurse specialists and seeing the invaluable work they carry out. Bronagh was delighted to be invited to speak at the NHIVNA conference.

Greg Mitchell has lived in London for almost 30 years and has somehow managed to avoid the daily grind by adapting himself to a variety of different jobs. He started his working life as a dancer, singer and actor, working all over the world and in the West End – and working in a variety of different jobs when work in the theatre wasn't forthcoming: delivery driver, chauffeur, sales assistant, project manager for a computer software company, telesales, fitness instructor, and even adult model and gogo daddy. He now works as a tantric masseur and writes on current affairs, gay politics, theatre and music reviews, whilst also writing a one-man show based on the years he worked in the sex industry. A participant in the PROUD study, Greg first started campaigning for its implementation in an article he wrote for the webzine TheGayUK in August of 2014. He has since been writing and speaking about PrEP whenever he gets the chance, with articles and photos appearing in Qx, Attitude and even the French magazine Les Inrockuptibles, and personal appearances at the EATG/AVAC HIV Prevention Conference in Brussels and a PrEP Roundtable discussion for HIV Scotland in Edinburgh. Kate Nambiar is a Specialty Doctor in Genitourinary Medicine at the Claude Nicol Centre in Brighton. She trained at Oxford University and at Imperial College School of Medicine, and has worked in genitourinary medicine since 2003 – initially at St Mary's Hospital in London and then in Brighton since 2005. Her clinical interests include the sexual health of trans and gender variant patients, and since 2012 Kate has run a specialist clinic (Clinic-T) in Brighton for the transgender community.

Angelina Namiba has over 16 years' experience of working in the HIV sector on initiatives ranging from providing one-to-one support to people living with HIV; to managing service provision; to facilitating, promoting and advocating for the involvement of women living with HIV in forming and informing local and national strategy and policy. She also works with adolescents and young people living with HIV, where she supports them around various issues and coping strategies including HIV treatment literacy and general well-being around living with HIV. Angelina is passionate about advocating for the sexual health and reproductive rights of women living with HIV. From 2012–2015 she managed the project From Pregnancy to Baby and Beyond (www.positivelyuk.org/pregnancy_and_beyond.php), which provided information, emotional and practical peer support to pregnant women living with HIV, men living with HIV and their sero-different partners. One of Angelina's greatest hopes for the future is for the day when treatment for HIV will be available, affordable and accessible to all those who need it globally.

Chris O'Connor trained as a business journalist in 1986 after taking a degree in philosophy. He has been news and deputy editor of UK and US business journals, covering issues such as the international wine business to the trade in counterfeit medicines. Diagnosed HIV positive in 1992, he has written for Positive Nation, National Aids Manual and Baseline magazine, covering many aspects of HIV, including fair access to treatment. Chris is Chair of the Patients' Panel at the St Stephen's Educational Trust, Chelsea and Westminster Hospital. People living with HIV, their families, reproductive health, fertility and conception rights have all been particular interests.

Joe Phillips started his nursing career as a ward nurse on the Department of Infectious Diseases at North Manchester Hospital. He then worked as a BBV specialist nurse at the Royal Liverpool Hospital where he first developed an interest in HIV/hepatitis C co-infection. After working with the hepatitis team at North Manchester he moved to London for a position at Chelsea and Westminster Hospital in 2013. Joe currently works as a Nurse Practitioner at 56 Dean Street & Dean Street Express, where he has continued to develop his interest in HIV/hepatitis C co-infection, particularly amongst gay men and in relation to the use of drugs for sex.



Nora Ponnusamy hails from Durban, Kwa-Zulu Natal, South Africa and completed her nurse training at a large regional hospital in Durban. She worked for a short time in South Africa before immigrating to the UK in 2001. Nora worked in various specialties before joining the Jefferiss Wing Centre for Sexual Health and HIV at St Mary's Hospital, Imperial College Healthcare NHS Trust, in Paddington, West London, in 2007. This is a specialty which Nora thoroughly enjoys, and she had a steady career progression to Clinical Nurse Specialist at the Haven, Paddington (sexual assault referral centre) from 2010–2014. This sparked her interest in the health needs of vulnerable and hard-to-reach populations. From 2011 to 2014 she completed a Master's degree focusing on male victims of sexual violence, an area she thought required a spotlight. One of the successful outcomes of this study was the introduction of a sexual violence questionnaire in the Jefferiss Wing. This ran alongside a domestic abuse prompt which Nora was also involved in spearheading. These questions, asked of all patients attending the Jefferiss Wing, have elicited many disclosures and provided opportunities to make a difference in difficult times for the patients. In 2014 Nora decided to return to mainstream sexual health, returning to the Jefferiss Wing as a Senior Charge Nurse, managing a large team of nurses and support workers. In August 2015 she took on the position of Nurse Practitioner in the Praed Street Project, working predominantly with women employed in the sex industry.

Zoe Rice is a dietitian at The Food Chain, a charity providing nutritional services for people in London living with HIV. Assessing the new referrals and providing specially tailored nutrition advice and grocery deliveries, she treats and supports a range of medical conditions with individualised diet therapy. She has developed and teaches the nutrition element of Eating Positively, a series of five interactive nutrition and cookery classes. The classes aim to increase confidence in health management and kitchen skills and to reduce the risk of developing further health complications. Zoe is a member of the HIV Care Dietitians BDA group.

David Stuart is the Substance Use Lead at 56 Dean Street, addressing the sexualised drug use by gay men (the practice commonly referred to as 'ChemSex'). He has been involved in the development of London's pioneering services Antidote, Club Drug Clinic and CODE clinic, and has been instrumental in placing ChemSex issues firmly on international public health agendas. He has been consulted by the governments and public health bodies of many countries across Europe, Australia and USA, including the World Health Organization/UNAIDS. David is a researcher, writer and lecturer on the issues of sexual wellbeing, substance use and HIV.

Marc Thompson is the National Coordinator of Project 100, the national peer mentor programme being managed by Positively UK. His role is to manage the roll-out of the programme, which aims to recruit and train people living with HIV to become peer mentors, across the country, and to work with providers of services to develop peer-mentoring programmes locally. Marc is also a co-founder of www.prepster.info, a community based intervention that aims to educate and agitate for PrEP access in England and beyond.
