

## Why here? Why now?

- Cuts across the NHS, Public Health, Local Authorities
- Defunding of voluntary and community based services in post-HAART era
- Shift in peer support from dying with dignity to LTCM
- Good value for money
- Cost and time savings to NHS services
- Reports of improved well being, confidence and management of HIV

- BHIVA Standards of Care for People Living with HIV 2013
- NHS England's 2014 Five Year Forward View says peer support should be seen as 'essential' to the future of the NHS.
- National Voices 2015 report Peer Support: What Is It and Does It Work?

#### P100 Aims

- 100% of people living with HIV in the UK to have access to high quality peer support
- Train up to 1000 PWHIV across the UK to become accredited peer mentors
- Partner with key stakeholders across the UK to develop and implement programmes for peer support and mentoring locally
- Develop National Standards for HIV peer support
- Evaluation of peer support by New Economics Foundation


As a peer mentor I've had the opportunity to work in my local HIV clinic. It's great to be able to contribute in the clinic and be seen as an expert patient.

## What do PWHIV say?

My doctors and nurses are great, but also having someone to talk to who had similar experiences to myself really helped me to manage my HIV.

Talking to someone who is going through the same thing as me, but I knew has been trained, has really helped me come to terms with my diagnosis.
